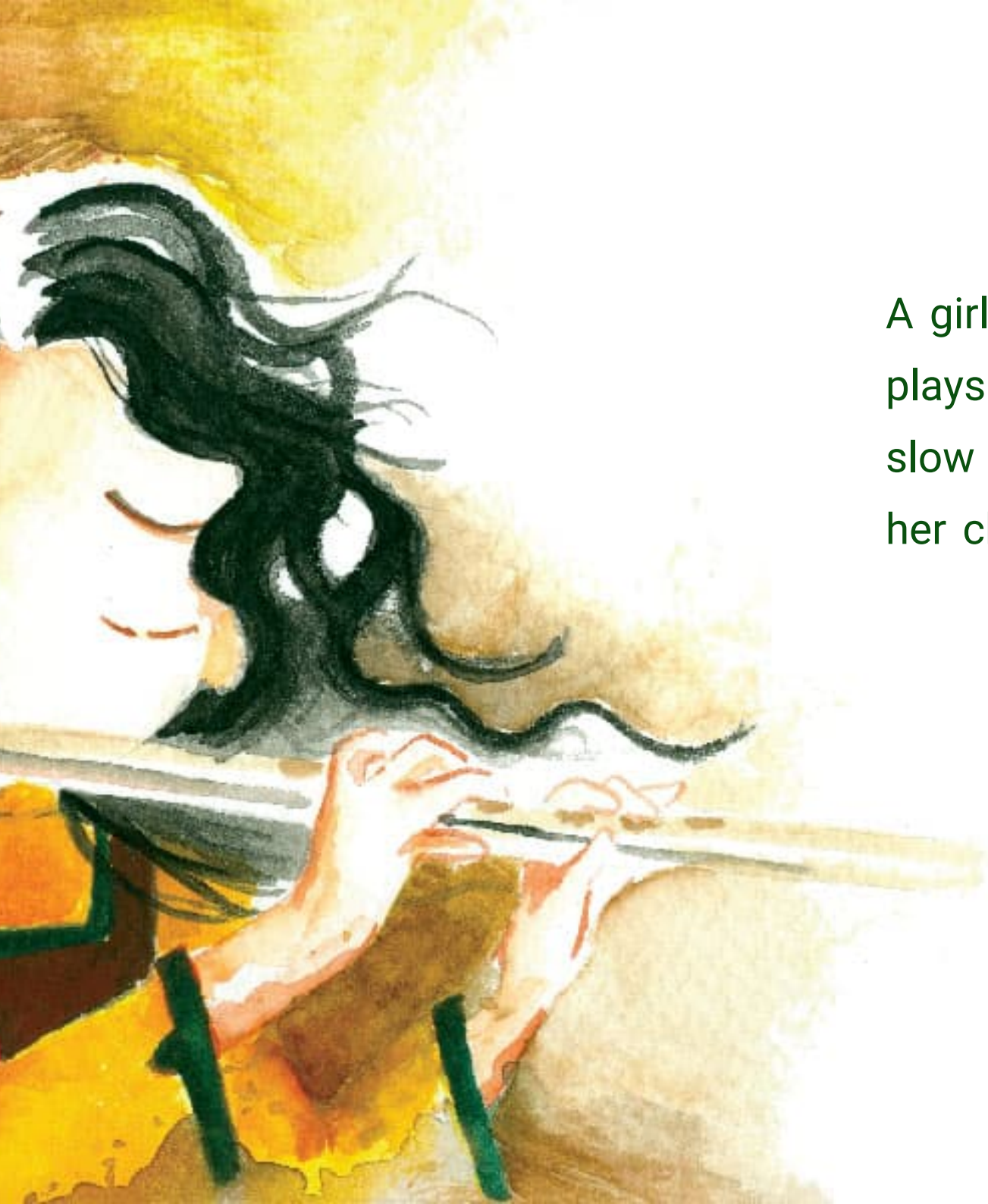


♫ Sad ♫ Tune

The rabbit tells the bird, and the bird tells the bee, and the bee tells the flower why the girl is so sad. She comes down from her window to see what the noise is.

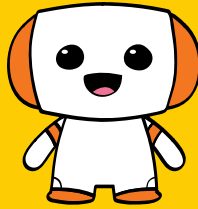
The critters of the field jump on her and shower her with kisses. 'Don't be sad, we are here,' they say.
