**WHO ATE IT?**



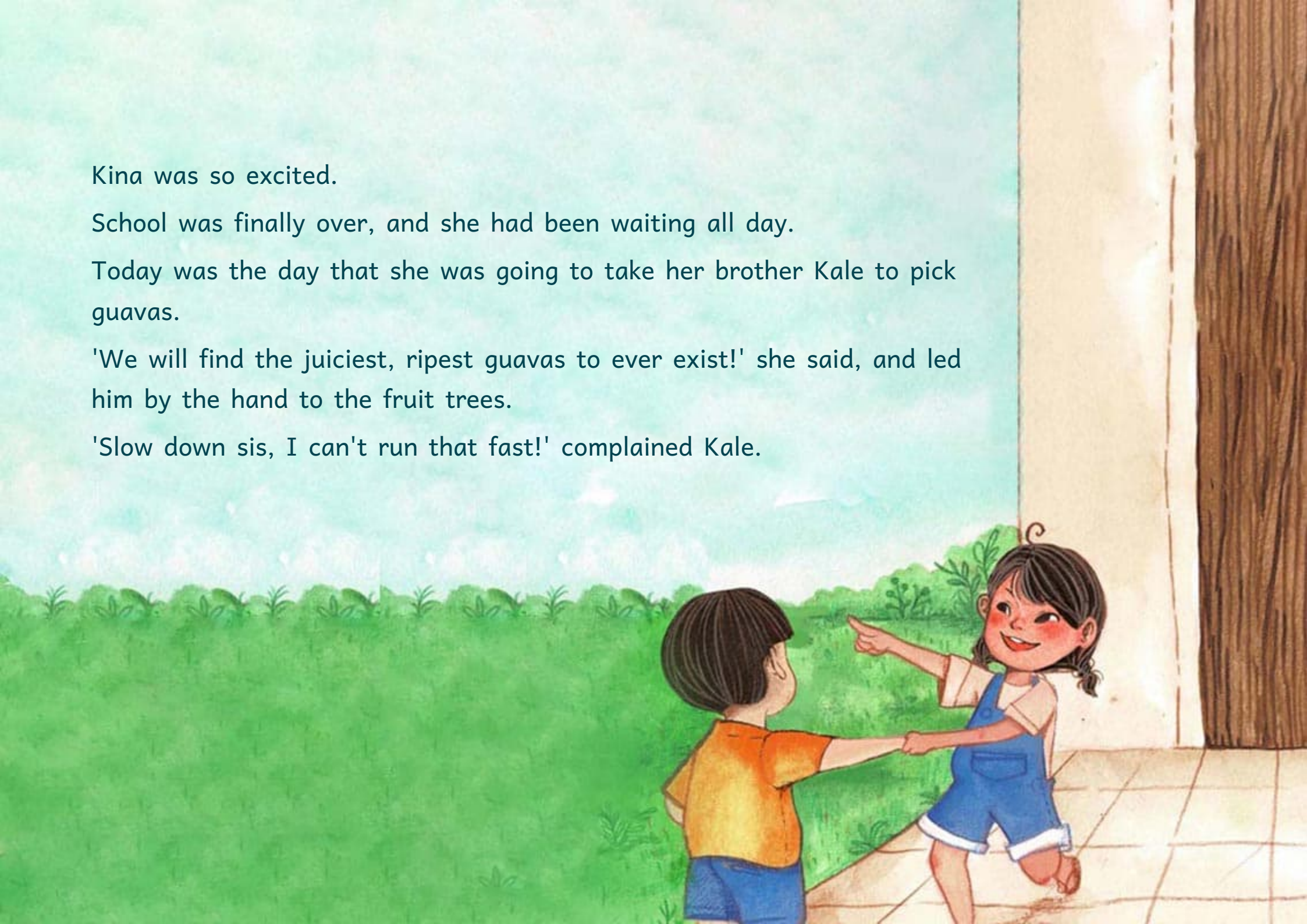
Kina was so excited.

'Again, the bite is too big to be from a bug!' said Kina, and rolled her eyes.



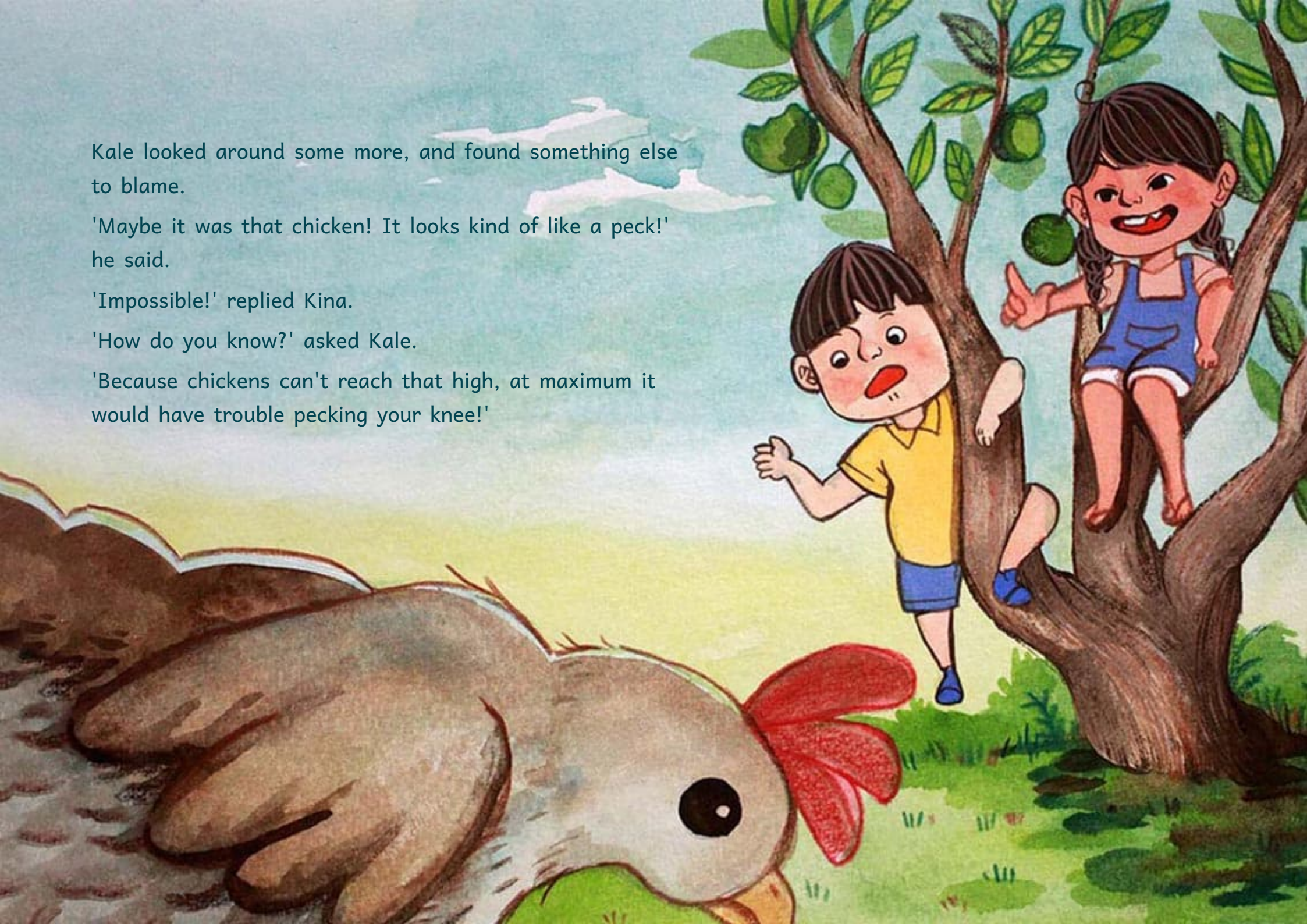
Kale looked around some more, and found something else to blame.

'Maybe what bit the guava could only come out at night, and that's why we haven't seen it yet?'





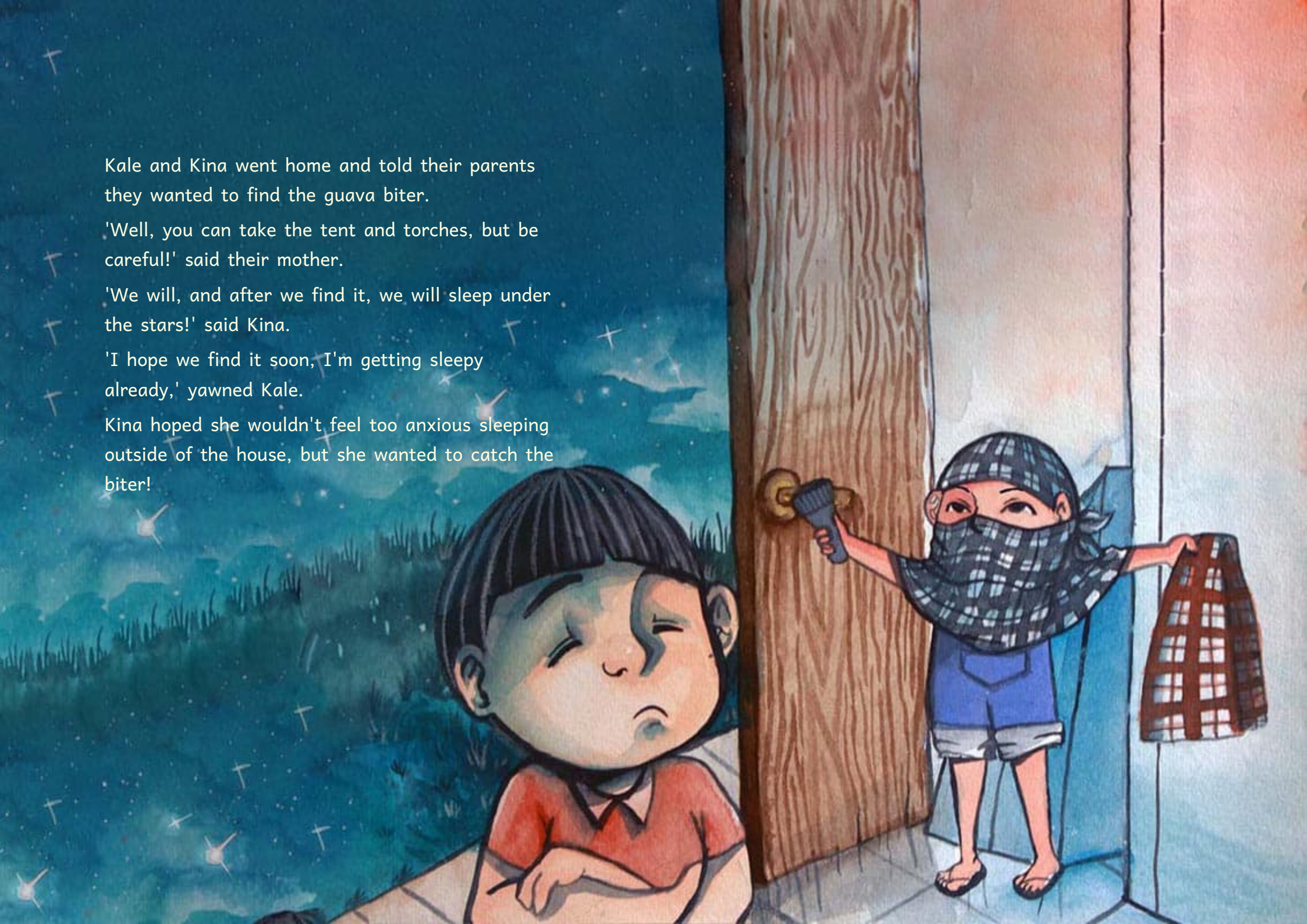
Kale and Kina went home and told their parents they wanted to find the guava biter.

'What's that?' whispered Kina.





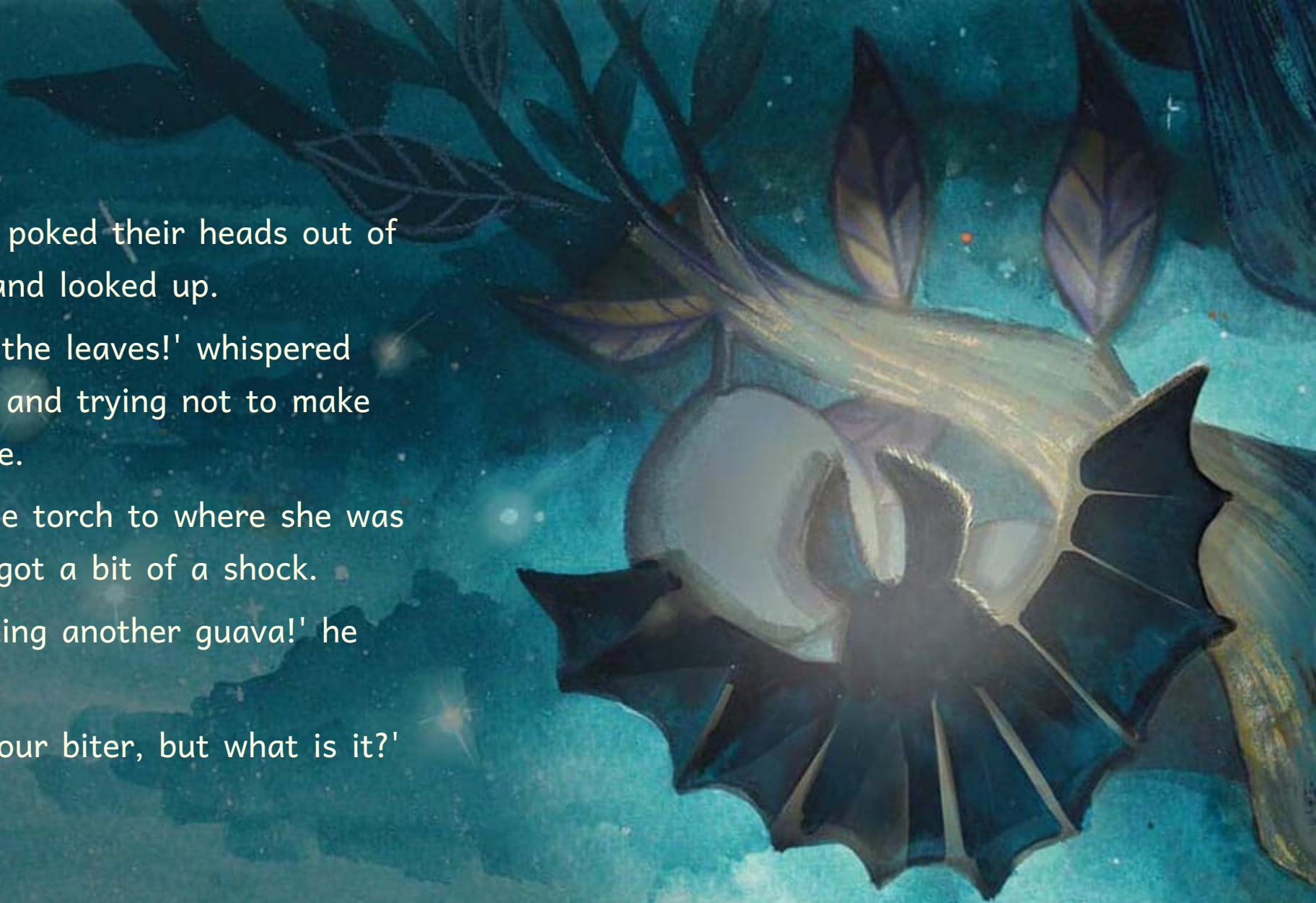
Kale and Kina poked their heads out of the tent exit and looked up.

'Well, what's it called?' Kale asked.

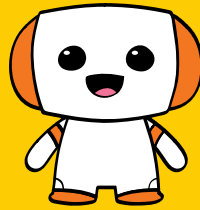
'It's a bat, of course!' said Kina.
