

Wheels are on a lot of things. They make them tick.












Some wheels are small and some wheels are big!


Clocks have wheels in them. They make them tick and tock.




We see a lot of wheels when we go to farms and work sites. It clicks just how many wheels we use.

But what if we had no wheels? How would we get by?








It might sound fun, but it can be hard to work with animals.
