


Grandma sees the mouse in the house first and jumps up onto the couch.

'There's a mouse in the house! I'm afraid of mice!' she yells.


'They scamper under your feet.'

The cat saw the mouse but is too lazy to chase it.



'Just look at us,' says mum with a laugh. 'We are hiding under the bed from a tiny little critter.'




Then the mouse does something unexpected.
